FROM THE PRO

Overcoming a Problem Area in Your Game

The route to winning the U.S. Open is no different form winning a local tournament - **practice, practice, practice.** Whether youÕresomeone who just wishes to have a more



consistent backhand or a pro honing your skills for a major tournament, you wonÕtealize your goals without paying your dues.

For some reason, the majority of tennis players havenÕdeveloped the same good practice habits as their counterparts in other sports. It[®] hard to find anyone who is even half-serious about golf who hasnÕt taken lessons from a pro and spent hours working on their swing. Have you ever met a golfer who has never visited the practice tee?

A lot of folks mistakenly assume that tennis doesnÕt require the same level of commitment. As for the minority who do allocate regular practice time into their weekly schedules, most simply play sets, rather than concentrating on a specific problem area.

Perhaps it[®] because tennis does appear to be relatively simple. However, there[®] a big difference between something that is simple and something that is easy. If practice wasn[®] both fruitful and necessary you can bet that l[®] chave spent a lot more of my afternoons fishing for bass and a lot less time hitting ball after ball in 90 degree heat.

The key ingredients to a successful training session are your determination to improve, your recognition of which flaws in your stroke must be remedied, and your ability to design practice activities that are targeted toward achieving one specific goal.
