### A BELTON TRIPLE AT SONOMA STATE TOURNEY

Walnut Creek® Heidi and Brad Belton continue to rack up individual and team tournament wins in 2002. Their most recent success came at the Sonoma State Summer NTRP, held June 14-16 at Sonoma State University in Rohnert Park, where each won singles titles and then combined to capture a mixed doubles crown. The top seed in Men® 3.5 Singles, Brad won three straight-set matches and downed Matthew Skahill of San Leandro in the final, 6-2, 6-1. Women® 4.0 #1 seed Heidi prevailed in a tough three-set final against Debra Harrigan of Pilot Hill 3-6, 6-3, 6-2. The pair then teamed to notch their third title of the weekend with a 6-0, 6-7 (4), 6-2 win against Shelley and Michael Smith of Napa in the Mixed 4.0 final.

## The appeal of POWER

Remember when you were in grade school and some advanced pal filled you in on their version of the facts of life? Chances are that you were fed a lot more misinformation than information. So



it is with people who learn to play tennis by observing and listening to others who arenÕtparticularly good. If knowledge is the key, then ignorance is the lock; or as a friend of mine calls it, Òlgnoranceon Fire!Ólncorrect concepts abound in tennis, probably because so few players ever take the time to get lessons from qualified instructors. This article is dedicated to shooting down the misconception some players have about stroking tennis balls for power.

To become a good tennis player you must be able to hit the fuzz off the ball. Wrong! Wrong! Wrong! Win a lot of matches and youOregood. Style points count in figure skating, they don Ofigure in the scoring. Most people who start playing tennis fall in love with the power shot. That 9 what you see many players doing on TV. There is a certain sex appeal attached to the shot that rockets off the racquet into your opponent@court for a winner. It@got the same charisma as a slam dunk in basketball or a home run in baseball, but you will never see a great player who tries to hit every ball for a winner. There are certain situations that call for trying to hit consistently, with depth or with placement. The truly exceptional player can hit winners, but they keep it under control and are equally proficient at playing percentage tennis.

Too much power can be counterproductive. The harder you hit the ball, the less consistent and accurate youOlbe. While spraying is good for killing insects, itO not nearly as useful for winning tennis matches. While just getting the ball back into play isnOthe answer, neither is excessive power an asset.

Top players have consistent strokes virtually all the time  $\tilde{N}$  many knock-the-cover-off-it types have never worked on consistency. After all, why practice something you almost never use because you $\tilde{O}$ retrying to end the point with one swing? It typically takes about 2 or 3 first round tournament losses for reality to sink in. The player is sent home and either works on their

#### **Court Use Card Fees to Increase in Mid-2003**

On June 4, the Walnut Creek City Council approved an increase in the annual Court Use card fees at the Tennis Center. Effective July 1, 2003, Walnut Creek residents will pay \$150 per year (up from \$125) and non-residents \$175. The council is also considering a proposal to eliminate the non-resident surcharge and raise the fee for all court use cards to \$175 by July 2004.






6-3 win over Dale Crabtree and Rachel Rose.


