WCRC Crashes Lakeridge Tourney









Over 20 WCRC members made the four-hour trip to Reno to compete in the Lakeridge NTRP at the Lakeridge Tennis Club over the July 4th weekend - several returned home with tournament Ohardware. Oh In a rematch of the 2001 Summer Singles League tournament final, Carmen Duarte defeated Linda Richardi 7-6 (5), 6-2 to capture the Women 3.0 championship. Duarte and Richardi then teamed to win the Women 3.0 Doubles. Martinez Ovalerie Fung-a-Ling continues to be mentioned in this column on a regular basis as she racks up more tournament wins. This time out, she dominated the Women 3.5 bracket by not losing a set in three matches and beat Auburn Colette Skaggs 6-1, 6-2 in the final.

In the Women® 4.0 division, Claudia Suh upset #2 seed Garbo Berger 6-4, 4-6, 6-2 in the first round before eventually dropping the final to USTA teammate Marie-Josee Parayre of San Ramon 6-2, 6-4. In the all-WCRC Women® 4.0 doubles final, Liz Riddle and May Wong narrowly defeated Suh and Parayre 6-2, 1-6, 6-4. Walnut Creek® Arlene Acosta won the Women® 4.5 Singles crown with a 6-1, 6-2 win over San Leandro® Phillis Storrs.

At the 25th Annual Beringer NTRP, held July 4-6 in Napa, #3 seed Ron Helgesson overcame a shaky first set before overcoming unseeded Matthew Skahill of San Leandro and captured the Men 3.5 title, 6-7 (3), 6-1, 6-1. Chris Ramsower-Pearlstein teamed with Kim Lackey to upset the top-seeded duo of Johnson/Nichols to win the Women 40 Doubles at the Marin Senior Championships, held at the Mill Valley Tennis Club on June 19-23.

Several WCRC members earned victories at the Walnut Creek Cracker NTRP, held July 14 & 15 at the Walnut Creek Tennis Center. Benicia Chris Bown teamed with Jim Cushing to win the Men 5.5 Doubles title with a 6-4, 6-0 win over Tom Armstrong and Peter Strotz of Oakland Hills. Mary Green won both the Women 5.0 Doubles and Mixed 5.0 Doubles. She and partner Rick O Brieneasily handled the Campbell husband-wife team of Darryl and Stacy Hein 6-1, 6-0 to claim victory.
