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THE PRESIDENT'S REPORT

Happy August!

Have you ever appealed up before? Do you know anyone who has? What is the reason for it? Is it pride? Is it because you would rather be labeled as a 4.0 rather than a 3.5, for instance? Or is it because you just want to play stronger competition and not play against lower-level players? All these reasons are understandable. I get it, but that last reason -- only wanting to play against "stronger" players instead of lower-level ones -- shouldn't be the sole determining factor.

From what I personally see, it seems like it's more women than men who tend to appeal up, and it's usually from the 3.0 to 3.5 or 3.5 to 4.0 levels. I know a few women who have appealed up, and whenever I ask them, the reason is that they want to play against stronger players and not lobbers weaker players. To me, I feel like they're doing a disservice to themselves.

For one thing, you can always play up. Just because you're a 3.0 doesn't mean that you can't play 3.5. And you can always say "no" if you don't want to play 3.0. That will always be an option for you.

Second, you're missing out on opportunities to play against lobbers weaker opponents. This is when you can hone in your skills and strategies against them, and you should be able to beat them if you believe you should get bumped up. If you're struggling against these players, however, then maybe you're not quite ready to appeal up just yet.

And lastly (and most important to me), by appealing up you may be limiting yourself from more playing time, especially if you play mixed or combo. Since there are fewer roster spots available, these teams tend to be more selective when recruiting players, so they obviously try to get the better players. A 7.5 combo team, for instance, is more likely to want you if you're a high level 3.5 than if you're an appealed up 4.0. And even if you do get on the team, you're likely to not get as much playing time as a 4.0 than as a 3.5.

For the past 12+ years I've bounced back and forth between 4.0 and 4.5, and I never once thought about appealing up. I know that by doing so would limit my playing opportunities, and I always have the option of playing up if I really wanted to. If the USTA algorithm thinks I should be bumped to a 4.5, then I let it do it. If not, then there's probably good reason for it. If you're thinking about appealing, I hope you think about these things before hitting that "Appeal" button.

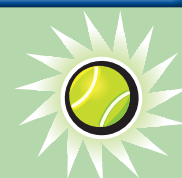

A Cal Golden Bear Who Migrated Through the Tunnel: Bruno Walker

WCRC member Bruno Walker has deep ties to the city of Berkeley, having grown up there and then attending U. C. Berkeley, but this Golden Bear has gradually migrated to a new lair on the east side of the Caldecott Tunnel with a different vibe that suits him well, as he has spent the majority of his life living in various cities in Alameda and Contra Costa counties in the gorgeous East Bay Area that we're all so fortunate to call home.

Bruno comes from a "tennis family", because his parents were both players and his family were members of the Berkeley Tennis Club. So as a young child Bruno learned the game there as well, playing in the shadow of the majestic Claremont hotel and studying under legendary instructor Dennis Van der Meer. With that background, Bruno began competing in junior tournaments at a young age, and interestingly his first memory of Heather Farm is from a junior tournament there in the early 1970's, when he was competing on court 4 and during the match he saw his mom roll up on the street in front of the courts in a brand new tan-colored Dodge Dart, a surprise to Bruno and the epitome of coolness at the time.

As a child Bruno was a multi-sport athlete, all the way through his matriculation in the first coed class at Head-Royce school in Oakland, where not only played tennis, but also competed in cross country, soccer, basketball, and baseball. Although his tennis game was well-honed by high school, soccer and baseball were also high on his sporting resume, and following high school he went on to play for the Varsity men's soccer team while attending Cal (go Bears!) Bruno was such a committed Golden Bear, in fact, that he spent many summers working as a cook at the Lair of the Bear summer camp in Tuolumne County, where U. C. Berkeley alumni and their families vacation together in the Sierras and have a friendly running competition between the "blue" and "gold" camps at the lair that ends with a heated softball game at the end of each camp session.

After college, Bruno took a brief hiatus from tennis as he focused on his family and building his career; he says it's not unusual for players who competed on the junior tournament circuit and played a lot of tennis during their youth to experience some burnout and take a break from the game at some point. Then, as he slowly migrated eastward, he and his wife Jane (no kids yet) moved to Moraga initially Lafayette. After starting their family, they joined the Moraga Swim and Tennis



Club, a community staple for families with young children in the idyllic small town. From there it was a natural move to join Moraga Country Club (MCC), where Bruno picked up a racquet to begin playing competitively again for MCC, and he also rejoined the Berkeley Tennis Club. It was while playing USTA league tennis for MCC that Bruno began to migrate further east to Heather Farm, because he got to know and like several many WCRC members while competing against them, so he decided to switch to a new tennis venue at Heather Farm, which he did about a decade ago. Like everyone who plays for WCRC, Bruno loves the camaraderie at Heather Farm and its family-like atmosphere. With his extensive tennis history, Bruno played at the 4.5 level when he initially migrated to Heather Farm, and joined several of Brian and Lisa Italia's teams, and now



he plays mainly for teams captained by Lloyd

Hohenstein, a longtime and well-known club presence. Some of Bruno's favorite memories from WCRC stem from going to sectionals with one of his 9.0 mixed teams in the Central Valley and renting a house together with his teammates during the postseason weekend. Many WCRC players can name that tune; those postseason weekends staying and playing together create a family atmosphere and a unique bonding experience that make our club such a special place to enjoy the camaraderie that the game of tennis can provide.

Bruno is currently settled in Lafayette with his wife Jane, who recently retired after a 41-year career with a steel fabricating company in Benicia, and their three dogs. Three dogs may sound like a lot to handle, but it's far less than the veritable zoo Bruno has maintained at his past residences, including raising horses and even cows (yes, cows!). Bruno is an avid animal lover who guided horseback riding tours in the Sierra foothills

Nevada on the side while he was following his Summers working at the Lair of the Bear. Other than playing tennis and herding his pets, Bruno's time is largely consumed by his beautiful family, all of whom are in the area so he sees them frequently. He still owns the house in which he grew up in the Berkeley hills, which is now occupied by his daughter Emily and her husband Noah, and their children Marin and Walker, who are 3 years old and 6 months respectively. His son George lives in Pleasant Hill with his wife Amelia and their one and their one and a half year old Ellie.

So Bruno and Jane are blessed to spend a lot of time with their children and three grandchildren, but he still finds time to pursue the work he is passionate about, which

is helping people enjoy fine wine. Bruno spent over forty years in the wholesale wine business, and is now semi-retired, doing independent consulting work with small wineries on their strategic plans and working part time in "Wines Thieves", an independent Lafayette wine shop. If you're looking for a fine vintage, Bruno's definitely your man.

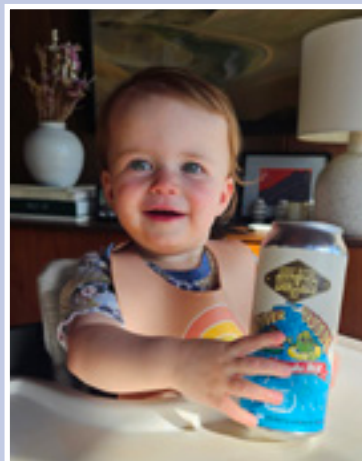


When asked if he has a nickname on the court,

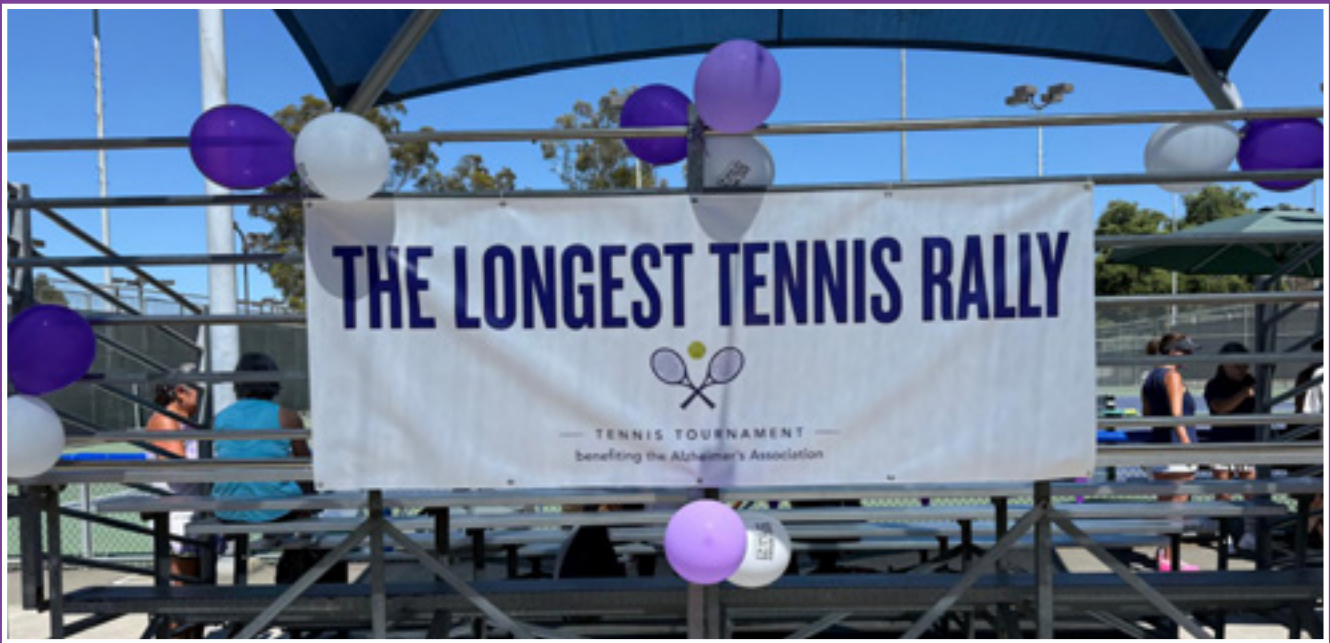

Many points are won or lost in the first four balls of a point. Use your serve warm up time to practice serving, returning, and hitting the next two shots cross-court to help calibrate these crucial shots at the start of every point. This way, you can start your match strong with these patterns warmed up. Returns and plus ones (a player's second shot after the serve or return) should generally be aimed cross-court in doubles and deep middle in singles. Cross-court targets in doubles keep the ball away from the net player allowing more time to improve court positioning and the deep middle target in singles prevents your opponent from being able to attack with pace or use angles.

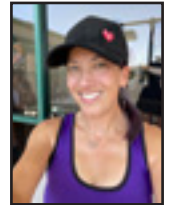
